
# **Paarl Nationals**

# **Reader Submission**

# Aspects of the situation in Paardeberg - Richard Stroud RDPSA

Generaal Piet Cronje's siege lines around Kimberley were finally broken on 15<sup>th</sup> February 1900 and he retired with his large force of burghers to laager on the banks of the Modder River near Paardeberg. He expected reinforcements to arrive from Bloemfontein and from the Orange River area and did not proceed further towards Bloemfontein. On 18<sup>th</sup> February, his large encampment was besieged by British forces, ending on 27<sup>th</sup> February with his surrender and that of some 4000 men.

# 1. News of Cronje's Force being Besieged


Postcard from the House of Commons, with the embossed insignia of the Commons in the top-left corner of the message side, addressed to *Mrs C. Tyrrell Giles, Copse Hill House, Wimbledon*. A QV ½d vermilion was affixed to pay the postage and was postmarked LONDON S.W. FE 19 00 at 6.30 PM. The message, timed at 6.30, reads:

"2 reports in the [Members'] Lobby, one that Cronje is surrounded and another that he is caught. C.T.G."

The news arrived via cable from South Africa. The first report was correct, being received the day after Generaal Cronje was surrounded at Paardeberg. The second report was a little premature!

C.T.G. was Charles Tyrrell Giles, born in 1850. He was Conservative MP for the Wisbech constituency from 1895 to 1900. In 1881, he married Isabella Mary, daughter of Jeremiah Colman, of Carshalton Park, Surrey, of the famous mustard manufacturing family. Giles died in 1940.





### 2. Lord Roberts accepting General Cronje's Surrender

On 27<sup>th</sup> February, after nine days of relentless siege, Generaal Cronje surrendered to Lord Roberts. A photograph by Perceval Landon depicts him next to his horse, meeting Lord Roberts.



Cronje's force was subsequently entrained for Cape Town to the POW Camps at Green Point and Belle Vue, most eventually being transported to St Helena. He, himself, was also exiled to St Helena. Extracts from the *Cape Times* give the details of their journeys down to Cape Town.

# CRONJE AT SIMONSTOWN.

IN THE ADMIRAL'S QUARTERS.

ARRIVAL OF BOER PRISONERS.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

CAPETOWN, Friday, March 2, 9,20 a.m.

Commandant Cronje, accompanied by his wife, son, and grandson, arrived here by special train at 6,30 this morning. There was no public demonstration, the military with fixed bayonets guarding the station, from which the public were rigidly excluded. Commandant Cronje appeared imperturbable. After the inevitable coffee his party entered the train again for Simonstown.

Saturday, March 3, 2.50 p.m. At Simonstown, Commandant Cronje was rereceived by a gnard of bonour of the Cape Garrison Artillery. After a general salute, he was placed in the care of a party of bluejackets, and he and his party entered three Cape carts, and were driven under except to the Pier, and conveyed on board a steam-launch to H.M.S. Deria, where Commandant Cronje occupies the Admiral's quarters. The Admiral was represented at the station by Flag-Lieutenant Kennard. The public was rigidly excluded.

ORANGE RIVER, March 2, 11 p.m. Another trainlead of Boer prisoners has just passed through, going South. From the joyful faces of the men one might well have imagined that they were bound on a pleasure trip. They crowded round the windows as the train steamed through the camp, waving their hands to the troops, and evidently anxious to get into the pictures which were being taken by the ubiquitous photographer. The attitude of the soldiers towards the prisoners is admirable. The men are ready and willing to perform any service to their conquered formen, whom they greet with smiling faces, to which Cronje's burghers respond with sympathetic grins .-Renter.

CAPETOWN, March 3.

The prisoners captured at Panrdeberg number 4,660. Three thousand of these are now en route, the remainder are waiting at Modder River.—Reuter.

arrived here. The other 3,000 will follow.—

# 3. A Soldier writes home from Paardeberg

Cover endorsed 'Soldiers letter. No stamps procurable' addressed to England and marked on the reverse in the same hand as the sender 'Paardeberg Feb 27'. Routed via the Army Post Office Base Office at Cape Town where the DC FPO B.O. \* datestamp was applied on MR 6 00. Taxed as unpaid in the Cape civil postal system but deleted in London and the LONDON PAID 25 MR 00 applied. Arrival backstamp of MR 25 00. The item was part of the mail carried on the contract-mail steamer *Scot*, which departed Cape Town on 7<sup>th</sup> March, arriving at Southampton on 23<sup>rd</sup> March.

# **Last months ZOOM Experiences**

The summer holidays are done now and most of the UK societies have resumed their meetings again.

#### CANADA MUFFIN BREAK

**Hugh Amoore** showed us how the Post Office dealt with redirected mail in the Cape Colony, and in the Union of South Africa.

Before the material was shown we had to understand the rules that were in place at the time:

#### **Rules on redirection 1**

In the Cape Colony additional postage was payable from the point of redirection to the new address, unless arrangements had been made with the Post Office for the Post Office to redirect mail, in which case it would be redirected at no charge and marked as officially redirected. This lasted beyond Union (31 May 1910) as uniform postal regulations for the Union took effect on 1 September 1911.

#### **Rules on redirection 2**

In the Union period redirected mail went free of additional charge unless

- A. It was **registered** in which case the item had to be re-registered and the registration fee paid (if not it was treated as POOC and taxed); or
- B. It was **reposted later than allowed** for a correction of the address of the addressee (the definition changed over time)
- C. It was **reposted to a foreign destination** and had not originally been paid the postage for the foreign rate: in such cases the deficiency ONLY was payable, or demanded from the recipient (and not double the deficiency. (*This was a UPU Rule*)



**The Rule on reregistering redirected mail**: in the first case this was ignored so the item was treated as Posted Out Of Course and Taxed double the registration fee  $(2 \times 4d = 6d)$ . In the  $2^{nd}$  case the item was re-registered and the 4d registration fee paid by a South African 4d adhesive, creating a mixed franking





Rudolf von Slatin Pasha was an Austrian soldier who was appointed Governor of the Province of Darfur. During the Mahdist Rising he adopted Islam. In 1883 he was taken captive; he remained in captivity for 11 years before escaping in a perilous three-week journey across the desert. Subsequently lionized, Slatin became a Pasha of Egypt and Brigadier-General in the Egyptian army. He was with Kitchener in the campaign against Mahdist forces in the Sudan in 1898 and wrote regular and vivid reports to the Queen. In 1900 he was appointed Inspector General of the Sudan.

#### Military & Civil history on Sudan of Sir Rudolph van Slatin Pasha - Inspector General of the Sudan.

Brought forward

Sir Rudolf Anton Carl von Slatin (1857 - 1932)
1874-1876 Visited the Sudan for the first time.
1878 Appointed Finance Inspector in Khartoum by Gordon Pasha.
1879 Appointed Governor of Dara in southern Darfur.
1881 Appointed Governor of Darfur
1884-1895 Held captive by the Mahdi at Omdurman.
1884-1895 Assistant Director of Military Intelligence.
1900-1914 Inspector-General of the Sudan

While administering Dara, Slatin conducted a campaign against a Darfur prince in revolt and later in 1882 when Rizeigat tribesmen of Southern Darfur rebelled, led by Sheikh Madibbo ibn Ali, a Mahdi Muhammad Ahmad convert. Slatin defended his province and fought many successful battles, but gradually lost ground. At Om Waragat he lost 800 men in 20 minutes and was wounded three times but fought his way back to Dara.

Believing his troops attributed their failure to him being Christian, Slatin adopted Islam in 1883 becoming Abd al Qadir.

The Mahdists captured el Obeid, capital of Kordofan, severing all Slatin's links with Khartoum. When Hicks Pasha's expedition was annihilated at the Battle of Shaykan in 1883, Slatin surrendered to his old enemy the Mahdist Emir Madibbo, refusing to sacrifice more lives. When the Mahdists reached Khartoum, an attempt was made to use him to induce General Gordon, the Governor-General, to surrender.

This failing, Slatin was placed in chains 26/11/1885, after the fall of Khartoum, he was shown Gordon's head.

After the death of the Mahdi, Slatin was kept at Omdurman by the Mahdi's successor, Khalifa Abdullahi, he was treated with a mixture of savage cruelty and comparative indulgence.

During his captivity, he worked as adviser and interpreter for the Khalifa and was made to serve as one of his bodyguards.

He was later to escape from captivity. He then became Pasha of Egypt and Brigadier-General in the Egyptian army.

Later to become Inspector General in 1900, being the only man to occupy that position.

#### Brought forward

Wellington, New Zealand Herald, Wednesday 31/5/1901.

In preparation for the bazaar now being organised, to build a new home for incurables in Wellington, one of the stall-holders. Lady Douglas, a woman of remarkable shrewdness and business energy, had the foresight to write letters all over the British Empire some time ago, asking for assistance on behalf of the bazaar. These letters went to all the notable men and women of the day, with the result that Lady Douglas now has for her stall a very attractive collection of autographs, autograph photos, and curios of all descriptions. Lord Salisbury, when he received her letter, sat down and wrote his autograph, " Yours faithfully, Salisbury." several times on a sheet of notepaper, which he has sent out in reply.

Mr. Chamberlain has done likewise. Lord Roberts has sent six autograph photos, and General Sir George White has forwarded a line panel! photograph, taken at Gibraltar. Sir Henrry Irving has sent a number of autographs, and an autographed photo. Lord Minto, Governor-General of Canada, and his wife, are represented by two fine autograph photos. Mr. I Balfour, Miss Ellen Thorneycroft Fowler, J Miss Beatrice Harraden, Lord Goshen, Lord Hamelton, and several members of the Cecil family, have also sent their autographs.

Lady Curzon. wife of the Governor-General of India, has sent a unique collection of bronze ornaments typical of India. The Administrator of the Seychelles Islands has I sent a lot of curios and photographs, and Lady Bower, wife of the Governor of Mauritius, has sent some curios from that country. Even Cecil Rhodes was written to. I am not sure whether Carnegie received a letter.

# **Collector Insights**

# A Comprehensive Guide to Forming a Specialised Stamp Collection by Alastair Macduff

Embarking on the journey of forming a specialised stamp collection involves moving beyond the general accumulation of stamps to engage in a focused and deeply rewarding pursuit. This endeavour transforms the collector into a curator of miniature masterpieces, each offering a window into a specific corner of history, culture, or the natural world. A specialised collection is a long-term commitment, requiring passion and diligent research to cultivate a collection that is both personal and philatelically significant.

## 1. Diagram Illustrating the Level of Specialisation

A crucial step in forming a specialised collection is moving from a broad topic to an ultra-specific niche by adding layers of focus.

Level	Hacus Description (Source Content)	Example Subject Niche (Source Content)
Level 1	Broad Topic (e.g., Thematic Collecting)	Birds / Cars / Space
Level 2	C-eographic Focus or Time Period Focus	Birds of South Africa / Racing Cars / The Apollo Program
Level 3	Specific Type or Detailed Time/Event Focus	Owls of South Africa / Formula 1 Winners from 1970–1979 / The Anglo-Boer War
Level 4	Ultra-Specific Item/Series Focus and Variety Hunt	The 1999 "Owls" definitive series of South Africa / Stamps and postal history (letters, censor marks) from the Anglo- Boer War period

## Items Hunted at Level 4 (Ultra-Specific Collection):

- First Day Covers (FDC)
- Cylinder Blocks (with printer's cylinder number in the margin/selvage)
- Postmark Varieties (different, clear postmarks from various towns)
- Known Errors or Flaws (documented printing mistakes like colour shifts)

### 2. Illustration of Essential Specialist Tools and Their Functions

The specialist moves beyond basic supplies to utilize tools necessary for examining and identifying varieties.

Tool Name (Source	Purpose/Function (Source	Why It Is Specialised (Source
Content)	Content)	Content)
Stamp Tongs	Handle stamps without transferring oils and dirt.	Must be thin, spade-tips (not pointed) to avoid damaging perforations.
Loupe	Examine fine details, printing methods, and tiny flaws.	Requires a 10x or 15x magnification (a standard magnifying glass is often insufficient).
Perforation Gauge	Measures the number of perforations within a 2-centimeter distance.	Essential because many classic stamps have varieties that differ only by their perforation measurement (e.g., "perf 14" vs "perf 15").
Watermark Detector	Identify patterns embedded in the paper (watermarks).	Watermarks are a key identifying feature of classic issues and their varieties.
Specialised Catalogues	Reference guides providing detailed information, issue dates, and value indications.	Must go beyond basic world catalogues to focus on sub-listings for colour shades, perforation varieties, and listed errors.

## 3. Illustration of the Specialized "Write-Up" Structure

The final goal of the specialized collector is the presentation ("write-up") of items on blank, acid-free album pages, transforming the collection into a historical narrative. The description goes beyond the catalogue number to detail the item's specifics.

D. Narrative/Contextual Details	Explanation of the variety, historical context, or reaso for rarity (e.g., This block shows the printer's cylinder number identified by the deeper carmine shade compared to the initial release)

















Also with "HRD" blacked out and overprinted with "NKA" (Nkana) in blue.
