



Simonstown was the strategic British Naval Port at the southern tip of Africa.

Simons Town to London

Irregular use of British stamps on envelope from Cape Colony – stamp not cancelled; but shows particularly clear hooded datestamp.



Envelope addressed to 'London SW'; wrongly stamped with British Jubilee issue 2½d stamp; envelope datestamped but stamp not cancelled with 'SIMONS-TOWN / * / 3 NO 97 / C'; no extra charge incurred.

SIMONS-TOWN

The Simons Town hooded die measures 19 x 24 x 27 mm. Frescura (2002) recorded it used from 11 January 1888 to 10 December 1902, which we can extend to 20 January 1903. The upper index is always '*' with a single letter in the lower index position. The following lower letters are known used: A, B, C, D, E & F.



to the 6-rayed asterisk and no vertical stroke.
The asterisk plug must have been insertable upright or sideways.





[Crown] R. / OPENED UNDER MARTIAL LAW'.

SIMONS-TOWN

Admiralty House, Simons Town to Castle Eden, England

Envelope with printed on flap 'ADMIRALTY HOUSE / SIMON'S BAY' in blue ink. The house was situated at the west end of the town close to the Railway Station of 1890 and the Toll Gate of 1815-1890.



Envelope addressed to Miss Harrison, Easington Rectory, Castle Eden. Stamped with 2½d pale blue seated Hope and Anchor cancelled hooded 'SIMONS-TOWN / * / 6 NO 89 / A'. Transit single circle 'CAPE TOWN / CAPE COLONY / NO 6 / 89'.



HMS Gibraltar in 1892

Built and launched in 1892 by Napier's of Glasgow, HMS Gibraltar was an Edgar Class cruiser of 7,350 tons and 360 ft length. She survived World War I and was sold in 1923. Her armaments included: two 9.2", twelve 6" guns and four 18" torpedo tubes.

Long chatty letter from Tom Fothergill to his sister describing his journey out to South Africa on board the Walmer Castle and of the passengers he met.

HMS Gibraltar was about to go on a tour of duty up the East African coast to Zanzibar.



Envelope addressed to Cranbrook, Kent; stamped with pair of Cape of Good Hope 1d view of Table Mountain cancelled with hooded 'SIMONS TOWN / * / 17 JU 02 / F' on reverse single circle 'CRANBROOK 3.30 AM / JY 7 / 02'.



LIMPUS, Vice Admiral Sir Arthur (1863-1931) KCMG, CB Joined Royal Navy in 1876 saw active service on China Station, the Sudan, and South Africa, where he received special promotion to Captain. Naval Adviser to Ottoman Navy 1912-14. on expulsion was awarded the Grand Cordon of the Ottoman Order of Medjidieh and the rank of Vice Admiral in the Turkish Navy. Admiral Superintendent, Malta, 1914-16.

Gibraltar, Hoetjes Bay, Saldanha Bay'; 1d Cape of Good Hope adhesive cancelled hooded 'SIMONSTOWN / * / 20 JA 03 / C'; single circle 'HOPEFIELD / 1 / JA 21 / 03' and 'HOETJES BAY / A / JA 24 / 03'.





Post card of Groote Schuur addressed to 'Highbury, London'; stamped with an Edward VII 1d adhesive and cancelled with hooded 'SIMONS-TOWN / * / 2 DE 03 / A'; delivery single circle 'HIGHBURY S.O. / N / 6.15.PM / DE 19 / 03'.

Groote Schuur was the traditional house of the Prime Ministers and Presidents of South Africa from the Union in 1910 to 1984. The site dating from 1657 was originally a 'Big Barn' of the Dutch East India Company. Much of the original building was destroyed by a fire in 1896 when it was under lease to Cecil Rhodes.

It was rebuilt under the supervision of the architect Sir Herbert Baker.
