Cape of Good Hope Government Gazette of 27 May 1847 bearing a weak strike of the one penny newspaper stamp of 1844 series on front page and also a halfpenny newspaper stamp of the same series on the supplement. A further strike of the halfpenny is applied later on the supplement (not visible).

PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE
SIR HENRY POTTINGER,

Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Major General in the Service of the Honorable the East India Company, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Castle, Town, and Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope in South Africa, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and Ordinary, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

For the withdrawing from circulation and cancelling of £1000 in Sterling Notes.

WHEREAS the sum of One Thousand Pounds in Sterling Notes of this Colony, with which the Treasurer and Accountant General stood charged to Her Majesty, has been withdrawn from circulation by my order, and has since been cancelled in obedience to my directions to that effect, as is fully set forth in the certificates of which copies are hereunto annexed, bearing this present day's date; And whereas it is not deemed expedient that any other Paper Money shall be issued in lieu of the aforesaid sum of £1000.

Now, therefore I hereby proclaim and make known, that the said sum of £1000 has been withdrawn from circulation and cancelled, and that no other Paper Money will be issued in lieu thereof.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

Colonial Office, Cape Town, 18th May 1847.

WHEREAS on the 2d of last month a Government Notice was issued at the Camp at Fort Peddie by order of His Excellency the Right Honorable the High Commissioner, announcing that all Persons who may be desirous of employing friendly Kaffirs as Servants on the terms mentioned in that Notice, were to communicate their wishes to the Secretary to the High Commissioner: And whereas it has been signified to His Excellency that the notification so made is understood to apply only to Persons residing on or near the Colonial Boundary.— Notice is hereby given, that that announcement was intended to be of general application, and to extend to every part of the Colony.

In order, therefore, to enable those Persons who may be desirous of employing Kaffir Servants to procure them, His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor requests all applications from Residents in the Western Districts of the Colony to be made to the Secretary to Government, and from those in the Eastern to the Secretary to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, in order that the necessary steps may be taken for supplying them. Applicants are requested to state how many Kaffirs (Male or Female) they wish to obtain as Servants to be em-

ployed, as their knowledge and information in their respective Divisions must necessarily be superior to his.

(CIRCULAR.)

2d November 1846.

Sir,—I am by desire of the Governor to request you will be pleased to transmit to me for His Excellency's information, a Return of Wagons, Horses, Oxen, Guns, Provisions, and other Articles, with the value thereof, as also of Cash furnished at the requisition of the Field-Cornets and by voluntary contributions, in your Divisions, for the use of the Burgher Force who have proceeded for the defence of the Colony, stating at the same time, in addition, the total amount of personal service and equipment in your Division, calculated at an average sum for each man mounted and not mounted, respectively, who proceeded to the Frontier. If compensation or payment has been granted for any of the contributions herein referred to, you will state the amount which has been allowed.
